Passion Sunday/Palm Sunday: Simon of Cyrene

Dear Friends,

Do you remember the narrative from Passion Sunday from Simon of Cyrene? Simon is the one who was told by Roman soldiers to carry the cross for Jesus to the place of the crucifixion. In the passion narrative, the names of his sons were read: Alexander and Rufus. Now, it may have seemed like a literary embellishment to talk about his sons. However, in this case, the sons are the real deal.

While we do not know historically whether Simon of Cyrene was Jewish or Gentile, we do know that he was indeed from Cyrene and his sons were living in Jerusalem at the time of Jesus' death. Rufus is named in the Gospel of Mark, as accompanying his father that day. Both sons went on to be faithful disciples of Jesus, and Rufus could possibly be the same Rufus that is named by Paul in Romans. The inclusion of Simon's name and Rufus' name may be indications that they were well-known figures in early Christianity whose names would be recognizable to other early Christian followers.

The story of Veronica is much less known. She is not named in the Biblical stories though she is identified by name in early Christian documents as the woman who wiped Jesus' face. It is said that she kept the cloth and carried it with her, becoming an early saint of the church.

I believe the story of Simon in particular illustrates the importance of how our faith is spread through our family and peer interactions. When we share what we believe

with others, we can impact generations to come. Simon, after carrying the cross of Jesus and interacting with his sons who were early followers of Christ, came to his own faith in Jesus. Eventually, all three men would share their faith with others.

We don't all have these same dramatic faith stories, but we can still share our love and knowledge of Christ with those around us.

Christ is risen!
