Dear friends,

Loading my kids in the vehicle, picking up ice cream cones, and driving around to look at the fall colors is a favorite activity of mine. I love to see the leaves changing color and fluttering off the trees, the bright sun lower on the horizon, and the plants and trees preparing for the upcoming winter. At the same time, I mourn the loss of the garden and flowers and the shade of the trees. We start to bring in the miscellaneous items that have accumulated in the yard over the past several months: kickballs and toys are put away, bikes are loaded into the shed, and we joke that anything not tied down could easily be blown to eastern Montana by morning.

In all of it, I am grateful. I'm grateful for the seasons that change and move around me. How boring life would be if it was always the same! I'm grateful for the harvest - our own meager harvest and the much bigger ones that happen around us. I'm grateful for semi trucks full of cows heading to market, and I'm grateful for the success of hunters. I'm grateful for the view of the mountains in the distance that remind me that I am but a small piece in a much larger world.

With Thanksgiving on the horizon, I wonder what my children will share this year. Each year on Thanksgiving when we sit down to our meal of not-turkey (anything but!), we go around the table and everyone shares something that they are thankful for this year. Family is always on the list of things we are thankful for, and church, and our beloved cat. We all have things we are individually thankful for as well.

Much like us, the ancient Israelites also had times in which they offered thanks for what God had provided. The Festival of Booths, also known as Sukkot, is a celebration of God's provision. That is, it celebrates what God has given, is giving, and will give. It recalls the past when God provided for the Israelites in the wilderness for 40 years, it celebrates the current harvest, and it anticipates that God will continue to provide for God's people in the future. (This is a simplification; to find out more, a Google search or Wikipedia can provide a deeper and more nuanced explanation.) I like this understanding of how God provides for us: past, present, and future. It would be a good exercise for each of us to consider how God has provided for us in the past, how God is currently providing for us, and how we anticipate God will provide for us in the future.

The Festival of Booths is celebrated with Psalms of praise and thanksgiving, especially Psalms 120-134 and Psalms 113-118. Psalm 81 in particular was designated to be sung during the Feast of Booths and recalls God's power and provision:

"Sing aloud to God our strength; shout for joy to the God of Jacob. Raise a song, sound the tambourine, the sweet lyre with the harp. Blow the trumpet at the new moon, at the full moon, on our festal day." Ps 81:1-3, NRSV

Blessings upon you as the seasons change and Thanksgiving draws near. May God's provision be ever upon you.

We especially hold close Barb Chigbrow who is now under hospice care after a short time in the hospital. Prayers for quick recovery for our pianist, Kim Peachy, as she recovers from a hand injury. During Kim's absence in the next few weeks we are grateful that Lisa Shull will fill in on the piano. We are thankful that Richard Benson is recovering from a back procedure in Kalispell which will alleviate his pain. Thanksgiving for Joe Hoseck who provided transportation for Richard for both the surgery and follow-up. May God's hand provide comfort as Rod Paronto undergoes infusions. As well we pray for both Billy McCullough and Ann Crawford's son as they undergo surgery this week. Prayers continue for loved ones suffering from mental illness.

With joy, we give thanks for the children in our midst who led us in worship this month; for the many we serve tirelessly in community outreach, especially FISH and the Food Bank; for the message Tammie Hickey provided us on Habitat for Humanity; for having former Pastor Tim Lanham in town to serve communion to some of our members in assisted living; and for all who quietly go about day to day tasks around Sunrise.

For the **Hope** and **Love** which fill our cup.

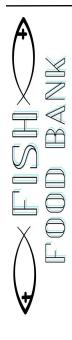
For the greatest gift of all. His Son our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen

Here are some quick and easy things you can do in as little as 60 seconds.

- 1.Breathe deeply it's a great way to reduce physiological and psychological stress.

- 3. Identify tension in your body and use to relieve stress.
- 4. Use mindfulness and identify five things you can see, four things you can hear, three things you can touch, two things you can smell, and one thing you can taste.
- 5. Write down three good things you have achieved today.
- 6. Stand up and stretch, walk around, or be active.
- 7. Pause what you are doing and take a moment to ground yourself in the present moment.
- 8. Engage with someone and talk to them about how you are feeling and thinking.
- 9. Ask someone close to you if you can offer them some help or support.
