Dear Friends,

Sometimes I'll ask folks the question, "What's going on?" The answers vary, but occasionally someone will answer with, "Oh, not much." And my reply to this? "That's great!"

There are times in our lives when having 'not much' going on can be a real blessing. A pause in activity, a time for decompression, a break in doctor appointments, or a hiatus from meetings and groups events.

We are busy. As humans, the vast majority of us - most of the time - like to be busy. And we're constantly filling our days with any number of things to accomplish this. Some productive, some not. Some enjoyable, some necessary. But all of it taking time and energy. It is enough to make an answer of 'not much' seem very nice, indeed.

When I have a day when I find my plate filled with 'not much', my automatic assumption is that I've forgotten something (this is occasionally true). But if it's truly a day without a lot of things on my calendar, I seem to find things to fill it. And rarely do those things include time doing not much.

It makes me wonder about sabbath. What does a modern sabbath look like? I talk to so many folks who spend Sundays prepping for the week: preparing meals, washing and folding laundry, cleaning the kitchen bathroom, and going grocery shopping. This doesn't sound much like sabbath in the sense of rest from work. But it does make the week ahead much smoother when we have meals prepared, clean laundry to wear, and plans in place. It does alleviate burden in that way.

If the weekdays are for work, and appointments, and meetings, and the tasks of living, and Saturday is for sports and family and entertainment, and Sunday is chore day - then when is sabbath?

We treat sabbath very much like it's no longer important. I know a few families who still keep firm boundaries around Sundays but that's rare. Instead, Sunday is as programmed as every other day, even if the tasks are different. Church > lunch > grocery shopping > meal prep for the week > laundry > catching up on the news. And none of these things are bad - they're good things to do. But it doesn't answer the questions: where is sabbath? Where is our time for rest?

We live in a culture that by and large undervalues rest. We use phrases like, "I'll sleep when I'm dead." We want to be as productive as we possibly can be.

But God has placed value on sabbath, and I have to believe that it's for a reason. Why does God value sabbath enough that it's in our Ten Commandments and that it shows up in our narrative of creation?

Furthermore, what would it look like if we just stopped being busy and productive for a day?

Would we all die of boredom?

Or is it possible that we might enjoy it?


