Dear Friends,

This summer I traveled on some rustic backroads with my mother accompanying me on the journeys to first Gillette, WY and then Driggs, ID. We passed through tiny towns that were completely closed up on Sundays, and that closed early much of the week. The one gas station, post office, and perhaps convenience store were dark as we went by them. They were weathered, having withstood the test of time but not without serious toll on the buildings and pavement. Potholes abounded.

I remarked as we went through one such place that I didn't know that I could survive living in a place with nowhere to run if I needed ice, or tummy medicine, or gasoline. I'm too used to the convenience of 7-daya-week shopping.

My mother reminded me that in mid-twentieth century America, shopping on Sundays simply wasn't done. The stores were closed, by law and by religious practice. It was a legislated sabbath, enforced by cultural norms. Laws follow action...too many stores and shops had been open on Sundays so laws were enacted to forbid the practice.

I'm not going to list the theological merits here: we know the various positions and arguments on Sunday shopping. Over time, stores have opened on Sundays along with restaurants, museums, cultural sites, and more.

In Jewish tradition (and a few Christian traditions like Seventh Day Adventist), Sabbath runs from Friday night to Saturday night. Knowing that, we can acknowledge that when God said to rest on the seventh day, God didn't specify which day of the week that was!

I asked a question in the June newsletter: What does a modern sabbath look like?

The importance of Sabbath is not the day of the week that we observe it, nor the laws that restrict or don't restrict it; instead, the importance is in the concept it represents. On the seventh day, God rested. God worked six days and then didn't work on the seventh day. There was time for rest and renewal, and also for reflection as God looked at the creation that had been constructed and proclaimed it good.

"God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day. Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work he had done. So God blessed it and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation." Genesis 1

Nowadays, it seems that Sunday is errand-day, clothes-washing day, pet-care day, get-ready-for-school day, shopping day, pay-bills day, and so much more. But we are still called to rest and reflection.

Perhaps modern sabbath is less about the day and more about setting aside time for reflection, rest, and regrouping. What restores your energy and fills your spiritual and emotional reservoir? What creates a break from the every-day in order that you might look upon what you have already accomplished and proclaim it good?

Friends, may you be abundantly blessed as we move from summer into autumn.

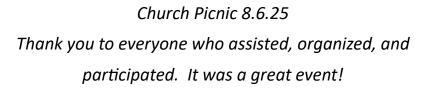

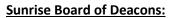
