Welcome to Advent!

Now, let's talk about music.

There is a debate among pastors and church musicians about what music should be used during the season of Advent. The season of Advent is meant to be a time of preparation and pondering as we move toward Christmas. Rather than telling the stories leading up to Jesus' birth, the scripture readings of Advent often focus on the resurrected Christ and the prophetic foretellings of Christ found in the Old Testament.

In order to match this time of preparation and scripture readings, there are specific Advent hymns. These are a separate category from Christmas hymns. If you look at the purple Glory to God hymnal, you can see in small writing above the hymn numbers "Jesus Christ: Advent" and "Jesus Christ: Birth" splitting between hymns 107 and 108. For purists, crossing the line between Advent hymns and Christmas/Birth hymns is a no-no.

The rationale for this definitive line comes from a theological perspective in which we understand Christmas to BEGIN on December 24/25 and not END at that time. Thus, the use of Advent hymns right up through the Fourth Sunday of Advent. Then the Christmas hymns are used through the day of Epiphany, usually celebrated on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday after Christmas.

I am not an Advent purist. Indeed, I'm even less so now that I have children. Christmas hymns are such a great way to teach the stories about Jesus' birth. Plus, most of them are easy to sing. And there is the added benefit that folks tend to generally like to sing Christmas hymns.

For worship, I try my best to cram as many Christmas hymns as possible into the bulletins without turning it into a sing-along and while still including some of the favorite Advent hymns – O Come, O Come Emmanuel,

Light One Candle, and others. At the end of the day (or end of the season, in this case), I'm not sure that it matters all that much which hymns we choose. We sing to the glory of God for the sake of worshipping God. Singing is a form of praising, and in some cases is also a form of praying. God's glory is lifted up in all our songs.

May Jesus Christ be praised! (Hymn #667)

In the years after Bill was no longer with us, Woody carried on the tradition of pointing it out to us to behold. Though neither of them are now with us, we continue to marvel at the cross as centerpiece of our celebration of Christ's birth.

The significance of the cross and the child, the cross and the star, the cross and the shepherds is not lost on me. For as we read the above scriptures from the prophecies of old to the Birth in Bethlehem, Jesus was born to be our Savior, our salvation, our redeeming grace. And so, at least for me, on this Christmas night as the light of the Christmas Star shines bright with peace and love, I think too of how the path to the cross and the light of salvation it reflects shines God's everlasting love on us.

With the promise of the star in our hearts, we remember those who are struggling during this advent season with illness, loneliness and grief. We pray that the hope inherent in the season will hold them fast. Rod Paronto is hoping to get home for the holidays after many struggles and setbacks. Prayers for Rod and Dixy. So many in our congregation have been touched by family members or friends dealing with cancer. Unless you consider the child."

That God would send His child to ordinary people like us is extraordinary. That the angels would first announce it to the simple shepherds is astounding. "And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors." (Luke 8:13-14)

May Peace, Joy and Love be with you as we Consider the Child and Cherish the Cross.
