What's in a name?

I love to hear stories of how folks were named, and how names are both unique and traditional. In my own family, we have our share of "name" stories and many other families do too. Names are passed down, names are uniquely chosen, names are combinations of other names – so many possibilities!

It reminds me that in the season of Easter, we are in the midst of a name change. The disciple <-> apostle name change, that is. The names disciple and apostle are often used interchangeably, though they are *not always* the same thing. Here's a bit of a breakdown on how we think about the similarities and differences.

Disciples are followers of Jesus. Oftentimes, we use it to give special name to the 12 disciples who were Jesus' inner circle of people. But it can also be used more broadly to be a name for any who followed Jesus in his teachings and behavior. This can be a literal following (those who were present with him in his life-time) or it can refer to how we as modern Christians follow the teachings of Christ. Even while this follows the definition of disciple, the primary way we see disciple used is when we refer to people who followed and knew Jesus while he was alive.

Apostles are people who teach others about Jesus. These are not necessarily people who met Jesus in person, though what we think of as the original Apostles are the eleven disciples after Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension. Paul, who was not a disciple in Jesus' lifetime, meets the risen Christ and is considered one of the primary apostles to Christian faith. Other apostles are named in scripture, including Junia of Rome, who was the only named female apostle. Jesus did send out his disciples as apostles – people who would go out away from him – to teach others about Jesus. While this happened during Jesus' lifetime, the word apostle is most often used to describe those who come after Jesus' death.

Here's the summary:

Disciples – followers of Jesus, in scripture usually referring to when Jesus is alive, but can also be used in modern context

Apostles – teachers and church planters, typically referring to the post-ascension time but with exceptions

Disciples can also be apostles. To be an apostle, you must be a disciple. Not all disciples are apostles.

This brings forth the question: what name do we give ourselves as individuals and as a faith community?

Are we disciples or apostles?

Are we followers of Jesus? If you've read this far, the answer is probably a resounding YES! We are disciples!

Are we teachers and sharers about Jesus? Perhaps. I believe this category can use some discernment.

Writer Tommi Waters says, "While disciples followed Jesus and learned from him, the apostles were in charge of continuing Jesus' ministry, spreading the gospel, and creating worship communities." Apostles continue Jesus' ministry, spread the gospel, and create worshiping communities. We do this! But

it is also an ongoing process. It is something that we can, and should, continue to strive for in Christian faith.

At the end of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus' great commission gives direction to his disciples: "Then the eleven disciples left for Galilee, going to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw him, they worshiped him – but some of them doubled. Jesus came and told his disciples, "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Here it is - be disciples! Be disciples who become teachers (apostles) who then make more disciples!

We may not be converting new Christians – but we can still fulfill God's call to teach, preach, baptize, and be faithful to the Word of God as found in Jesus Christ.

Our Environmental Initiative Programs from 2022 continue their activities in 2023.

<u>Pill bottles</u> are still being collected in bins in the hallway on the sanctuary level underneath the coat rack. Place your bottles into the bin for them to be processed. We will wash, bleach, and remove any labels from the bottles before sending them to a program that reuses pill bottles in the United States and abroad.

The <u>aluminum can recycling</u> continues to be a success. Our bin is full usually every 3 weeks or so and then Eric Chigbrow takes them to recycling. Money earned from can recycling is being used to pay for shipping of pill bottles for their reuse program.

The <u>Crayon Initiative Collection</u> last year was a big hit and a lot of fun. We will repeat that this year with crayon collection May 25-June 5 and crayon sorting in Fellowship Hall on June 11 during fellowship time. Crayons will be sorted then shipped so they can be re-melted and made into new crayons for distribution at hospitals across the country. To date, 709,000 boxes of crayons have been distributed and 53 million crayons have been kept out of landfills.

The <u>product exchange</u> will take place in May. Bring items you don't use such as shampoos, conditioners, lotions, colognes, etc. that are more than half-full and in their original containers. Leave them on the table for someone else to take home! See something on the table you like? Take it home! The exchange is entirely free and any leftover products will be distributed to a local organization caring for unsheltered peoples.

SHARING OUR SUNRISE JOYS AND CONCERNS

Here it is. One full month since spring officially has begun and nearly two weeks after Easter. The scene greeting me this April morning was nearly a foot of heavy, wet snow. While struggling to be thankful and joyous for the moisture this spring storm would bring to the crops and the prospect of the lawns smiling in their new green coat, I couldn't help but be a little dismayed. Though from an early age as a farmer's daughter I was taught to always be grateful for moisture, my reaction was one of disbelief and surprise at the amount of snow and the day looking more like January than April.

How different this day was compared to three days earlier. Spring in its finest. Nearly 70 degrees with the sounds of spring birds coming from the trees poised to bud and the occasional crocus or tulip doing it's best to push through the cold, dark dirt on a quest to soak up the warmth and glow of the sun.

And it struck me. Just as the disciples grappled with the surprise at the tomb of which the women spoke, we too pray for the faith to accept the unexpected in our lives, knowing the Risen Lord is beside us through it all.

Filled with joy for a life well-lived, we remembered along with Pastor Tim the life of his dear wife, Gigi Lanham, in a memorial at the camp. Through her struggles and triumphs she always had that signature smile on her face that we remember. The scripture read from John 12:24 says in part. "...Unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds." This metaphor seems especially meaningful during this time of Easter. A life lived in Christ produces much bounty and promises hope both in life and death. And for Tim and family and friends left to continue on we hear the words from another scripture used at her service. "Weeping may linger for the night, but joy comes in the morning." (Psalm 30:5)

Continued prayers for those sick or hurting. We especially remember this month Joyce Newman and her son Darrell. Darrell has been placed under hospice care after a stroke earlier this year. May God's grace be with them. And we continue to pray daily for Rod and Dixy Paronto as Rod struggles with many health issues. For those not mentioned but held in our hearts may the promises of Easter sustain you.

Joys abound in our lives. We give thanks for the moisture this spring has brought. How blessed we are to hear the voices of several young children in worship these days. They bring laughter and joy to our lives, keep Pastor Jessica on her feet with some of their responses to her questions and give hope for the future. 
