Dear friends,

I listened to a recent interview with writer-director Cameron Crowe in which he described how his family taught him that optimism is something you have to fight for. At a moment when the world seems to be filled with bad news, that struck me as an important statement. It is easy to get drawn into bad news, depressing conversations, and fear-spiraling thoughts.

It raises a question for me: how can our faith help us to find optimism when things look and feel bad? It is a question not just for this social moment, but for other times in our lives when "things hit the fan," so to speak.

For me, leaning into the words of the Psalms brings comfort and a sense of leveling that I don't always find in the world outside of faith.

"Lord, you have searched me and know me. You know when I sit down and when I rise up. You discern my thoughts from far away....Even before a word is on my tongue, O Lord, you know it completely. You hem me in, behind and before, and you lay your hand upon me." Psalm 139

While we each have our own interpretations of these words, for me it is a reminder that God knows me and loves me, imperfections and all. God knows who I am, knows what I do, knows how I think, and God still surrounds me even with all that knowledge of my inner being. That means, for me, that God must also know when I am struggling and when things are tough. God knows when I'm sad, when I'm angry, when I'm happy, and every emotion in-between. God knows when I am struggling and yet God still surrounds me each and every day.

I also drawn comfort from the 23rd Psalm: "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I fear no evil, for you are with me. Your rod and your staff comfort me....You anoint my head with oil, my cup overflows."

How often do we feel like we are slogging through life with a dark cloud over our head, or that there are bad things in the world that we are trying (sometimes desperately) to avoid? In the midst of difficult moments, this psalm reminds me: God still is providing blessings – an overflowing cup of goodness.

We don't always know what's to come in the world or in our own lives. But we can trust in God's faithfulness from generation to generation. We can live secure in the knowledge that God is beside us, hemming us in – surrounding us with goodness. When optimism is hard to find, we can lean into the assurance that God knows us and knows all of our needs.

May God's blessings be with you in these early weeks of autumn.



What do those a's, b's, and c's stand for that show up in scripture verses? This indicates that there are separate thoughts within a single verse. For example, on Oct 13, verse 3 from Habakkuk chapter 2 has two sentences within it. 2:3a indicates that the reader should stop at the end of the thought (end of the first sentence).

If you see a scripture reading and then additional parenthesis like on Oct 3, this indicates that the primary reading is Deut 34:9, but reading the verses in parenthesis can help to add context or richness to the reading.
